#### **NEW BUSINESS**

### Alliant Property Insurance Program

Seth Cole of Alliant Insurance Services presented highlights of the unique manuscript features of The Alliant Property Insurance Program (APIP), its membership strength, and the future for the JPIA. Some of the highlights included reviewing the significant coverages and the differences between APIP and the JPIA's current program. In short, APIP provides property coverage for the member's buildings, contents, mobile equipment, boiler & machinery and cyber risks. The all-risk limits available to our members under APIP are \$1 billion, per occurrence, as compared to the current coverage of \$150 million; additional enhancements are seen throughout the APIP coverage document.

APIP also includes Errors & Omissions, miscellaneous unnamed locations, and Off Premises Service Interruption which was not covered under the current JPIA Property Program.

### ACWA JPIA Claims Data January 30, 2018

### **BACKGROUND**

The claims history for the JPIA Property Program had been very favorable for the past several years. The graphs represent recent history in the Property Program.

### **CURRENT SITUATION**

The Property Program has suffered, what may turn out to be, the two highest loss years recorded. The 2016-17 policy year currently has projected losses in excess of \$6 million which includes two large flood losses. The 2017-18 policy year has projected losses in excess of \$2.2 million, and does not include any potential losses as a result of the flooding/mud slides in the Montecito and Santa Barbara areas. The 2017-18 policy year includes losses sustained in the wild fires in both Northern and Southern California.


The Program maintains a \$100,000 retention and insures approximately \$5.5 billion in property values.



# Highlights

Natural catastrophes caused economic losses in excess of USD300 billion globally in 2017 and insured losses of around USD130 billion, making 2017 one of the most costly years for the insurance sector on record according to Fitch Ratings.







### ACWA JPIA 2018-2019 Property Insurance Renewal

### **BACKGROUND**

The JPIA's Property Program renews on April 1, 2018. For this renewal period, the JPIA has three options from which to consider.

### **CURRENT SITUATION**

As discussed throughout the last several months, the JPIA experienced significant catastrophic property losses over the expiring program year. It began with flooding losses and ended with a devastating mudslide. These events coupled with the catastrophic losses in the United States has made this renewal extremely challenging.

The JPIA currently purchases reinsurance from the commercial market on a standalone basis. Under this type of individual program, we are not insulated from the market nor from our own losses. Because of this dynamic, Alliant and staff will review three options for the Committee to consider. In addition to the stand-alone program, staff will describe two alternate programs that will provide broader coverage and be achieved at a lower cost than if we remain alone in the commercial market.

With all scenarios, the pool retention will remain the same at \$100,000 per occurrence.

### **RECOMMENDATION**

That the Property Program Committee discuss the options presented and make a recommendation to the Executive Committee on the 2018-2019 property insurance renewal.

### ACWA JPIA Renewal Pricing January 30, 2018

### **BACKGROUND**

Deposit premiums for the 4/1/18-19 policy year are to be mailed to the members at the end of February. The last member premium rate change was for the 4/1/15-16 policy year, where the premium rates were reduced by 10%.

### **CURRENT SITUATION**

The Property Program Expected Revenue/Expense & Funding Requirement report provides a breakdown for the expected revenues and expenses for the 4/1/18-19 policy year. The total estimated premium with no pricing changes (option 1) is approximately \$5.7 million based on \$6 billion in total insured values (TIV). The premium is based on an estimated excess insurance cost of \$2.1 million and claims expense of approximately \$1.2 million. The 2017 actuary report projects a \$.019622, per \$100 of value, loss rate for the 4/1/18-19 policy year. The recommended renewal for excess insurance might change given some additional pricing expected to be received after packet printing. Different scenarios and options will be discussed at the meeting.

### **RECOMMENDATION**

That the Property Program Committee recommends that the Executive Committee approve a 5% decrease (option 2) with the following rates:

### ACWA JPIA 2018-2019 Memorandum of Property Coverage

January 30, 2018

### **BACKGROUND**

The JPIA's Property Program renews on April 1, 2018. With the two options being considered, the JPIA's Memorandum of Property Coverage requires to be amended and adopted for the 2018-2019 program year.

### **CURRENT SITUATION**

Moving forward, the JPIA's Memorandum of Property Coverage (MOPC) is being amended to become a reverse follow form document. A reverse follow form coverage document means that the JPIA is now providing the exact coverage to the membership which is found in the insured property program. The JPIA will assume the first \$100,000 per occurrence; thereafter, the insured portion will cover amounts over \$100,000 following the provisions of the insuring policy.

The revised MOPC is written in a manner to ensure there are no gaps in coverage from the risk sharing layer up through the insured program.

### **RECOMMENDATION**

That the Property Program Committee recommend to the Executive Committee to approve the amended 2018-2019 Memorandum of Property Coverage.

### **MEMORANDUM OF COVERAGE**

### FORM NO. ACWAJPIA 2018-19P

#### 2018-2019

This Memorandum of Coverage (MOC) sets forth the terms, conditions, and limitations of coverage provided to **Members** under the MOPC. The terms of this MOPC may not be changed or waived except by amendment made a part of this MOPC.

Throughout this MOC, words and phrases that appear in **bold** have special meaning. They are defined in Section I, "Definitions" or in the Master Program document.

### SECTION I – DEFINITIONS

In addition to the definitions provided in the **purchased insurance**, the following additional definitions apply to the MOC for this Pooled Property Program (PPP):

- 1. **Authority** shall mean the Association of California Water Agencies Joint Powers Insurance Authority.
- 2. **Loss** shall have the same meaning as in the **purchased insurance**.
- Covered Party shall mean a Member who has sustained a loss which is covered under this MOC.
- Purchased Insurance shall mean insurance purchased by the Authority for the benefit of the Authority and the Covered Party and specifically identified in the Declarations.

### <u>SECTION II – COVERAGE AGREEMENT</u>

 The Authority will reimburse the Covered Party named on the Declarations for losses to scheduled property that is insured by the terms and conditions of the purchased insurance, less any applicable Covered Party deductible. All property must be scheduled prior to loss or within thirty (30)

- days of acquisition in order for coverages and limits under the PPP, or **purchased insurance**, to apply.
- 2. This MOC incorporates the terms, provisions, and conditions of the **purchased insurance** except with regard to that portion of any **loss** which is the subject of this PPP.

### SECTION III – LIMIT OF LIABILITY

The limit of liability of the **Authority** for each **loss** shall be the amount of the deductible as specified under the **purchased insurance**, less the applicable **Covered Party** deductible under this PPP, but in no event more than the amount stated in the Declarations.

### SECTION IV - DEDUCTIBLE

The **Authority's** liability under Section III above shall be reduced by any applicable **Covered Party** deductible.

### **SECTION V – COVERAGE PERIOD**

This MOC applies to **losses** occurring during the coverage period defined in the Declarations.

### **SECTION VI – EXCLUSIONS**

In addition to any exclusions set forth in the **purchased insurance**, this MOC does not apply to:

- Flood; however, this exclusion shall not apply to loss or damage caused by or resulting from ensuing fire or explosion or any other perils insured under this MOC.
- 2. Contamination by "pollutants" introduced at any time, into, under or upon land, water, or the atmosphere, or any watercourse or body of water or aquifer. This exclusion applies whether or not the contamination is introduced intentionally or accidentally or gradually or suddenly and whether or not the **Covered Party** or any other person or organization is responsible for the contamination.

"Contamination" includes any unclean, unsafe, or unhealthful condition, either actual or potential, which arises out of the presence in the environment of any "pollutant" whether permanent or transient. "Environment" includes land, bodies of water, underground water or water table or aquifer, the atmosphere, and any other natural feature of the earth, whether or not altered, developed or cultivated. "Pollutant" means any solid, liquid, gaseous, or thermal irritant or contaminant, including smoke vapor, soot, fumes, acids, alkalis, chemicals, airborne particles or fibers, molds and/or fungus, and waste, including materials to be discarded or to be recycled, reconditioned, or reclaimed.

This exclusion does not apply to contamination or dispersal of "pollutants" which is itself caused by fire, lightning, impact from aircraft, explosion, riot, civil commotion, smoke, collapse, vehicles, windstorm, hail, vandalism, malicious mischief or leakage and accidental discharge from automatic fire protective systems.

- Earthquake; however, this exclusion shall not apply to loss or damage caused by or resulting from ensuing fire or explosion or any other perils insured under this MOC.
- 4. War, whether or not declared, insurrection, rebellion, terrorism, or revolution. Terrorism is defined as an act, including but not limited to the use of force or violence and/or the threat thereof, of any person or group(s) of persons, whether acting alone or on behalf of or in connection with any organization(s) or government(s), committed for political, religious, ideological or similar purposes including the intention to influence any government and/or to put the public, or any section of the public, in fear.
- Nuclear contamination.
- 6. Damage intentionally caused by or on behalf of a **Covered Party**.

### **SECTION VII - CONDITIONS**

- 1. The Authority shall have the same rights as provided to the insurer by the **purchased insurance**.
- 2. If there is insurance other than the **purchased insurance** applicable to the **loss** incurred, such insurance, unless it specifically states that it is excess of this coverage, shall reduce the liability of this **Authority** by the amount that insurance is liable for such **loss**.

- 3. In the event of loss covered under this MOC, the Covered Party shall give immediate notice thereof to the **Authority** of such **loss**.
- 4. If the **Authority** pursues subrogation of a **loss**, the funds from any recovery shall first be allocated to payment of the expenses of the subrogation and then to reimbursement in full for payment of the claim and adjusting expenses. The **Covered Party** shall be reimbursed its deductible from any remaining funds.
